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PERSONAL STATEMENT:

My research aims to understand the differential mechanisms that link childhood adversity with adolescent mental health disorders, or resilience from these disorders. In my publications, I have drawn on research theory and methods spanning from social science, learning theory, child development, neuroscience, and I have used innovative statistical analyses techniques. My work has clear implications for treatment and intervention of those with a history of childhood adversity, both in terms of providing awareness, and mechanistic understandings of the effects of abuse and neglect as well as in potential factors that may ameliorate the neurocognitive effects of child adversity in adolescence. In addition to the general impact of my work, I am a passionate advocate of the distribution of research to the public of these findings. For instance, together with researchers from Groningen University, I developed an [online open access course for adolescents about mental health](#). Furthermore, I have spoken on the BBC radio and television, and organized a symposium on resilience that was sold out to members of the general public. I took maternity leave from Sept 2012-March 2013 and from March 2015-Aug 2015, and worked 80% in 2014. In addition, between September 2013 and February 2015 my son required many acute prolonged hospitalizations. **I am 3.8 full time years past PHD.**

Together with researchers from the University of Groningen, I gained funding for, and over the course of one year we developed a free 5 week online video based interactive course for young people about mental health. We developed two free online adolescent mental health courses: one in English and one in Dutch. The modules in the courses includes videos and information on prevalence, risk and resilience factors, prognosis, and possible treatments. These 'facts and figures' are complemented with personal stories by adolescent (English and Dutch actors) who experienced the problems themselves. The contents were published online for final review in November, and the course launched in January 2018, preceded by a marketing campaign. Since its start in January 2018; we have had over 5000 subscribers that completed the course worldwide. We found that in addition to attracting adolescent participants from the UK and Netherlands, our participants are from around the world and range in their ages from adolescents to grandparents interested in how they can help their children. Participants can share their thoughts and comments to each of the videos, providing them with an opportunity to feedback on the course, ask questions, and to learn from each other. My contribution for this work was nominated for a Vice Chancellors Public Engagement with research award at the University of Cambridge.
